Tomorrow ends Affordable Housing Week (May 9-15). On Monday, I joined a panel of professionals to discuss Housing is Healthcare: Solving Homelessness with Permanent Supportive Housing. I shared that The Sophia Way understands that home can mean different things to different people. We believe that one-third of the women we serve on the Eastside would benefit tremendously from supportive housing. And, a big part of that includes mental health services. When we are looking at the funding for the Health Through Housing initiative from King County and the State, it is essential that there are funds allocated for behavioral health.

There is hope as we move forward. We are working with Plymouth Housing on their <a href="Eastgate">Eastgate</a>
<a href="Permanent Supportive Housing">Permanent Supportive Housing</a> project that will have units for people from the Eastside. And, King County Executive Dow Constantine, in his <a href="2021 State of the County">2021 State of the County</a> to the King County Council, announced the first Health Through Housing purchase of a hotel in Seattle that will house those experiencing chronic homelessness. He also spoke of plans to purchase properties in more cities, "bringing safe, supportive housing to 1,600 of our unhoused neighbors this year and next."

And finally, May got off to an exciting start with GiveBIG! The community gave over \$72,225 including matching gifts from Hayes Family Fund and Emerald Heights, to further our mission to provide many more women a place of hope and change. Special thanks to everyone who participated in our most successful spring fundraiser!
