Every day, case managers provide needed support —

Rebecca needed a storage unit to store her belongings after she lost her home but did not have sufficient funds to cover the expense. Her case manager found an organization that provides storage lockers in exchange for volunteer work. Rebecca is relieved her precious possessions are now safely stored until she can save enough to move into a permanent home.

Amira felt it was impossible to find an apartment within her \$950 budget. She had been evicted earlier and did not want to go through the trauma again. Her case manager helped her understand and manager her finances. With support from The Sophia Way, Amira is confident she will have the resources to prevent another eviction and is actively looking for an apartment.

Mysta broke her ankle. With her recent move to Washington without medical insurance, her hospital bill was overwhelming. Her case manager helped her apply for Medicaid and with financial assistance from the hospital, Mysta was able to get her life back on track.
